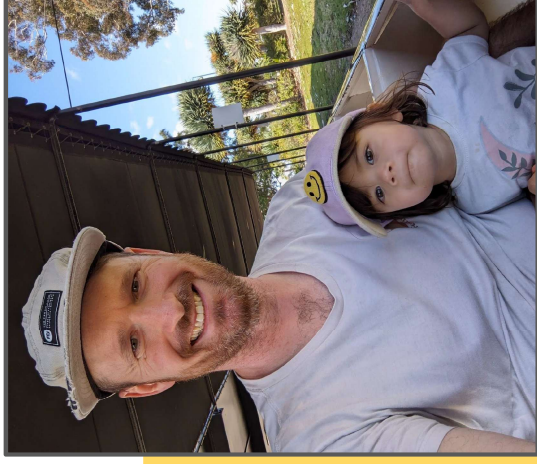

Introduction

High Tech High Chula Vista 12th Grade Teachers, Dr. J (Jennifer Jones Wilson) and Mr. Mark Poole are looking to collaborate with Downtown Chula Vista Businesses in Spring 2027.

We want to create a community project where students learn “real world” economics issues and support businesses through engineering and design.



Humanities & Downtown Chula Vista

In her spring course, Dr. J teaches economic principles.

After interviewing local businesses, students will be able to understand core ideas of economics and global economics through the experiences of downtown Chula Vista businesses.

At our exhibition, students would teach about these ideas through a board game.

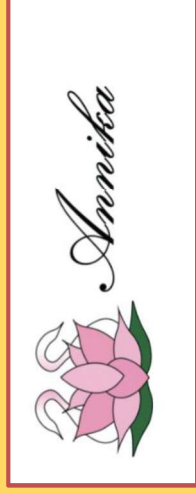

SUMMARY

In this project, 12th graders at High Tech High Chula Vista learn about graphic design and the design process through developing a professional logo that represents their personal brand. Using Adobe Illustrator, students follow a design brief that focuses on color, typography, and symbols in order to communicate personal values and beliefs.

PRODUCTS

Each student creates their own individual logo and curates their personal brand through a "brand guide", a 1-pager that outlines color schemes, fonts, and variations of their logo.

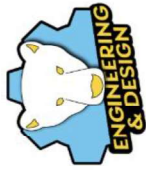

ESSENTIAL QUESTION

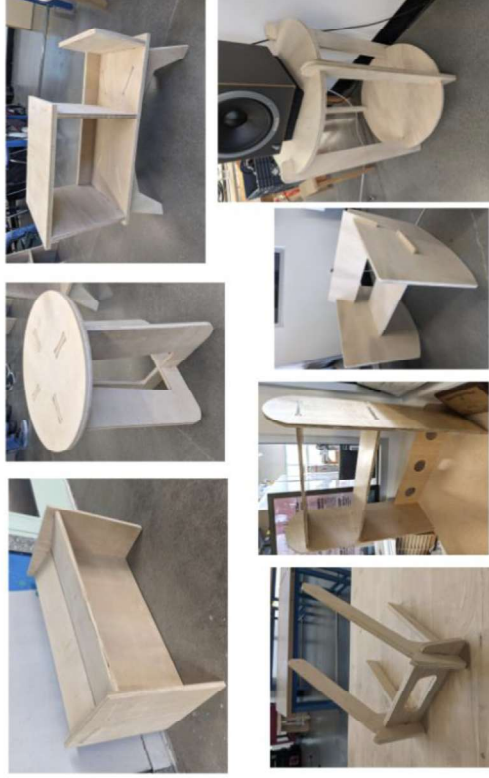
How can technology allow us to design and produce higher quality hand built products?

SUMMARY

In this project, 12th graders at High Tech High Chula Vista work in teams to design a minimalist plywood product for a client. Past clients have included peers, parents, teachers, and a daycare center. Students work through the engineering design process gathering data, exploring design ideas, and ultimately building a product through the use of Computer Aided Design (CAD) and digital fabrication (CNC).

PRODUCTS

The main restriction for products in this project is that they must be made out of plywood and they must be assembled without any form of hardware (screws, bolts, brackets, etc.). This means that products must be joined through other methods such as slots and tabs. Products have varied from small table top accessories to large pieces of furniture. Examples of past projects can be seen below.

CVPD, Senator Padilla's Office, District 1 Supervisor Office, Mayor McCann's Office, Councilmember Preciado's Office	Don Giaquinto, from Mayor John McCann's office, recited feedback from the preliminary data report conducted by the City of Chula Vista's traffic engineer, F Street through G Street. The report stated that excessive (85%) speeding is not an elevated occurrence through Third Avenue. Further data will continue to be collected on Third Avenue as the engineering department continues northbound.	<i>No action taken.</i>

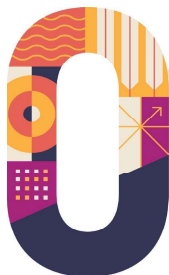
