BROWN ACT. Government Code 54950 (The Brown Act) requires that a brief description of each item to be transacted or discussed be posted at least 72-hours prior to a regular meeting. The Corporation posts all Board and Committee agendas at meeting location and on the EVA website. Action may not be taken on items not identified as such and posted on the agenda. Meeting facilities may be accessible to persons with disabilities. If you require special assistance to participate in the meeting, notify Dominic Li Mandri at 619-233-5009 or via email at dominic@newcityamerica.com at least 48-hours prior to the meeting. **VIRTUAL MEETING / COVID-19.** Due to precautions associated with COVID-19 and following current state law (AB 361) regarding the Brown Act, all EVA Board and Committee meetings, until further notice, will be held by teleconference only. Members of the public can listen and participate in meetings over the phone and through the internet.

On September 16, 2021, AB 361 was adopted on an urgency basis (AB 361, section 9) meaning it has immediate effect. Shortly thereafter, Governor Newsome issued an executive order delaying implementation until October 1. After October 1 and through January 1, 2024 (when the bill sunsets), bodies subject to the Brown Act can continue to meet electronically (without the need to allow the pubic to participate from a physical location) after making specific findings and subject to added requirements.

Findings

A body subject to the Brown Act may continue to meet virtually when:

- 1) it is meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency AND
- 2) either: state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing <u>OR</u> the body is meeting to determine or has determined by majority vote, whether as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.

Thereafter, at least every 30 days the body must make the following findings by majority vote:

- (A) The legislative body has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency.
- (B) Any of the following circumstances exist:
 - (i) The state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person.
 - (ii) State or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing

Additional Requirements

In addition to requirements established under the Governor's Executive Orders, public entities that continue to meet virtually must also:

- Allow real-time public comment; may not require public comments to be submitted in advance.
- Allow people to register (get in line) to give public comment during the entire public comment period for a given item.
- Suspend any action in the event of a service interruption. If there is a disruption (within the agency's control) that prevents broadcast of the meeting or prevents the public from providing comments, the body may not take actions until service is restored or those actions may be challenged.

We believe the budgets based on history perpetuate the inequality that has existed, and we will not have the money to make substantial change in the future. We request that next year's budget takes this into account.



Inclusions

- 1. **PHASE 1:** ProCal will provide design documents, manufacturer information, and electrical load calcs (specific to new load) for permit submission.
- 2. **PHASE 2:** Bid assumes that existing electrical infrastructure at base of midblock poles is in working order, and will NOT require fuse replacement or other repair.
- 3. **PHASE 2:** Bid assumes voltage available at base of pole is 120v.
- 4. **PHASE 2:** Bid assumes "in working order" structural integrity of existing midblock poles.
- 5. **PHASE 2:** Bid assumes single gang GFCI Receptacle Outlet.
- 6. **PHASE 2:** Intent is to use a GFCI receptacle per Electrical code, and to utilize an "in-use" bubble cover.
- 7. **PHASE 3:** RGB product from Color Kinetics maintains a 5 year manufacturers warranty.
- 8. **PHASE 2 & 3:** Bid assumes use of a 20' Electric Scissor Lift throughout duration of install of Phase 2 and Phase 3.
- 9. **PHASE 2 & 3:** Bid assumes that all work will be done from the sidewalk, without intrusion to the right of way.

Exclusions



- 1. All subterranean work .
- 2. Replacement of existing poles or midblock post top luminaires.
- 3. Traffic Control.



Qualifications

- 1. Pricing is based on acceptance entire scope. Pricing may change if a scope needs to be changed or removed.
- 2. It is presumed that the existing electrical service/equipment can accept any/all of the added electrical equipment/ demand, and that all existing equipment is in good working conditions to accept the alterations per the above scope of work.
- 3. Pricing is based on the quantities as detailed above and does not necessarily represent a one for one installation.
- 4. Pricing is based on lay-down for tools, equipment and material being in the immediate area.
- 5. This bid assumes that the staff facilities will be available during this time to assist access to the site, and during the commissioning process.
- 6. Pricing is based on providing safe-off only for electrical devices and equipment to be removed under the demolition scope of work. Salvage or storage of any equipment/materials is by others.

Exclusions


- 1. Any work other than what is specially mentioned in the scope noted above.

- 4. Spare materials.

- 6. Utility fees.
- 7. Seismic Bracing to existing conduits.

1. DIRECTIONAL
The look of the branding elements can be seen as a directional arrow. This works well to be directional beacons for people walking through the East Village area.





2. BURST
The overall concept of the design is on that of the burst. The idea of energy and a bold piece make this element so unique.

SML - GUERRILLA BRANDING

THE WRITING IS ON THE WALLS. Small installations on buildings, with the approval of the owner, could boost the artistic feel of the location while still bringing branding to East Village. Through phrases, common color usage, or style of fabrication, these pieces could tie the area together in a less expensive yet feasible manner that won't have to go through heavy city permitting to accomplish.

MOUNTING HARDWARE

These pieces can be mounted with anchors to the buildings. There would need to be an agreement to allow the posts to be set, but they would be minimal and extremely strong.







INSPIRATION & MOUNTING

Anchors would have to be set into the building. Alternative mounting options for attachment to light poles / electrical posts / trees / etc. can be established.

The pieces should have an illumination so that they can be seen at night, helping to brand the neighborhood day and night in a subtle yet interesting way.





The unit, when attached to the wall, would stand off the wall approximately 27".


Shown in this picture is a breakdown of the elements and how they will relate and connect to one another.



A small display can be located at the base of the mounted element with a QR code for people to walk by and link into information about East VIllage. This could be mounted on wood or on the brand color 3Form material, with an etched in street linework of the East VIllage area, with markers for pertinent locations.






