#### GIVE-OR-GET FUNDRAISING BOARD POLICY

Adopted on February 2, 2016 / Effective on July 1, 2016 / Amended September 10, 2019 May <u>4, 2021</u>

Effective September 10, 2019<u>On May 4, 2021</u>, the Little Italy Association Board of Directors revised its<u>amended the Little Italy Association's</u> "Give-or-Get" (GoG) Policy. The expectations forexpectation of each Member will be to:

- 1) "Get" monies via donations to the Association for specific projects/programs; and/or
- 2) Volunteer for special events with a max number of hours set forth by this Board; and or
- 3) "Give" monies that have not been fulfilled by the above methods.

Our<u>The Board's</u> goal is to have every Member meet a minimum of \$1,500 in cash and/or inkind donations. This amount may be reviewed and adjusted at the end of each fiscal year for the next fiscal year to help the Association meet fundraising goals.

The ways that the goals, per Member, GoG obligations can be met are by the following methods:

- 1) Raise \$1,500 cash; and/or
- 2) DonateContribute \$1,500 in-kind; and/or
- 3) Purchase mandatory tickets for Little Italy events and/or
- 4) Volunteer hours for Little Italy sanctioned events at a max of 10 hours per Member (Value: \$75 per hour worked).

A record of donations and volunteered hours<u>Members must self-report contributions they</u> have made or secured and hours volunteered so that staff can validate and add to their GoG <u>Summary</u>. The GoG Summary will be maintained for each Member by staff. Members will be provided a quarterly report for review or upon request. If there is a discrepancyare any <u>discrepancies</u>, it is the responsibility of the Member to provide <u>verifyingstaff with additional</u> information to staff.

Contributions, larger than the minimum requirement<u>GoG obligation</u>, can be rolled over for a max of one (1) fiscal year.





# Column: San Diego is still trying to become a "City of Villages"

El Cajon Boulevard, Convoy District have visions of creating vibrant, pedestrian-friendly street life enlivened by local culture

Little Italy is the gold standard for urban neighborhood development in San Diego.

As communities eye future transformations, their boosters often look longingly at Little Italy — its walkability, vibrance, mix of restaurants and shops and housing, and its popularity.

Of course, no place can replicate the character and charm of the historic neighborhood just northwest of downtown San Diego.

But increasingly, areas that don't have much in common with Little Italy are hoping to create their own version of that kind of energy, whether it's the pan-Asian themed Convoy District in Kearny Mesa or the multi-ethnic stretch of El Cajon Boulevard.

Those two communities are among the latest being considered for ambitious makeovers, essentially along the lines of San Diego's "City of Villages" approach.

Nearly 15 years ago, San Diego's general plan included the concept to direct growth into "compact and walkable mixed-use villages" while maintaining neighborhood character. It took many years to get to there.

That's what is being discussed today, perhaps with a greater focus on more transit, housing density and bike lanes— three often-disputed goals. Those have become standard in development policy, in part, to reduce automobile travel and cut climate-warming greenhouse gas emissions. Also, many officials believe bulking up housing is needed to moderate prices.

Such plans generally would allow for narrower streets, wider sidewalks, parks and public spaces. Initially, "City of Villages" seemed more aspirational than realistic. A handful of <u>pilot</u> <u>projects</u> were proposed nearly two decades ago, but didn't turn out as planned because of a lack of city resources, among other things.

While some aspects of the villages approach have been incorporated in various parts of the city, San Diego may be poised for more major steps in this direction.

"It's going to be an overnight success that took 50 years to happen," joked Michael Stepner, professor emeritus at the NewSchool of Architecture & Design and former San Diego City architect. He also served as director of planning and housing at the San Diego Economic Development Corporation.

Stepner added the caveat that there are big hurdles to clear before what's being envisioned for El Cajon Boulevard and the Convoy District can be realized.

At the moment, it's hard to look at much of El Cajon Boulevard and see the potential for anything like Little Italy. The busy thoroughfare was once U.S. 80, the main east-west highway through central San Diego.

Yet the emerging BLVD 2020 plan aims to slowly turn that four-mile, car-centric stretch into a series of pedestrian-friendly neighborhood hubs with mid-rise housing, restaurants, urban plazas, parks, art displays and event spaces, according to a <u>report</u> this week by David Garrick of The San Diego Union-Tribune.

Right now, an automobile also is needed to get around much of the Convoy District, but the potential for change there may be greater.

The area already is a popular Asian dining destination and home to a plethora of supermarkets, entertainment venues, medical offices, churches, ethnic media outlets and nonprofits.

Last fall, the City Council voted to officially name the area the "Convoy Pan Asian Cultural and Business Innovation District."

Councilman Chris Cate, whose district includes Kearny Mesa, said the designation "will help further transform the greater Convoy area into a vibrant cultural center, dining destination and innovative economic hub."

The heavy lifting will be turning the blueprint for the area into a more walkable reality.

Finding the resources to pay for basic infrastructure and other public amenities seems increasingly difficult.

The private end of development also has its challenges.

Speaking specifically of El Cajon Boulevard, Stepner said the main question is two-fold: Will there be enough investment interest and if there is, can the area avoid gentrification and higher rents that force existing residents and business out?

"That's going to be the trick," he said. "How do you pull that off?"

Still, he said, "There's so much that can be done, so much potential."

San Diego real estate analyst and consultant Gary London agreed with the potential, and the degree of difficulty.

He said a lot of the parcels on El Cajon Boulevard have been in families for many years, even generations — and that makes it hard for developers to assemble enough property to make projects pencil out.

London noted that city rules have been changed to allow for greater housing density, but they also require projects to include more units for sale or rent at below-market rates. That requirement puts financial pressure on developers and the answer often is to make smaller units.

While those may be more desirable for younger and older residents, he said market studies show an unmet demand for family housing.

"They're not accommodative at all for families," said London, senior principal at London Moeder Advisors.

He's not suggesting traditional single-family homes with a yard are what's needed in urban neighborhoods, but row houses or townhouses that can provide similar interior space vertically on a much smaller footprint. With those, the need for nearby parks and other public amenities is paramount.

London said much of San Diego's development future, and its ability to provide enough housing, will depend on what happens in urban neighborhoods — and whether more urbanlike projects will be built in some suburban areas.

There's not much undeveloped land left in the region. Even thousands of homes approved by the county on the urban fringe face an uncertain future because of legal battles related to wildfire threats and other environmental concerns.

"This is a transitional moment," London said. "We're looking at a very urban future, different from our suburban past."

Difficult though that transition may be, "there's a ton of opportunity there," he said.

This is something people have been talking about for a long time.

A modern-day version of the "City of Villages" concept that has become trendy in development discussions is the "<u>15-minute neighborhood</u>." The idea is what people need in daily life — schools, markets, restaurants, rapid transit, parks — should be within a 15-minute walk from home.

It has taken more than 15 years for that essential concept to be considered for the Convoy and El Cajon Boulevard areas. Only time will tell whether it takes that long for those plans to come to fruition, if ever.
