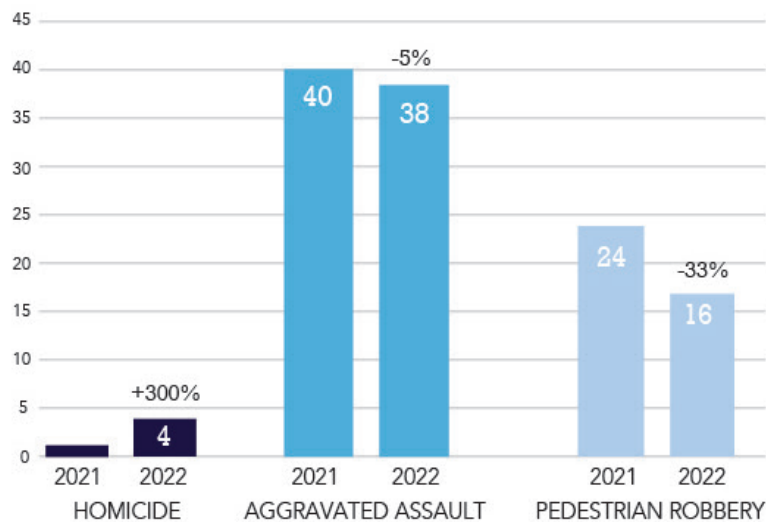


Overall crime remains low and is down -26% year-to-date.

The Midtown Improvement District attracts more than 60K people each day who live in, work in or visit the area. The District has only experienced 16 violent crimes YTD in 2022 that are considered “stranger-on-stanger.”

Violent Crime is Down -10% Year to Date

Your chances of being the victim of a violent crime in Midtown remain extremely low.

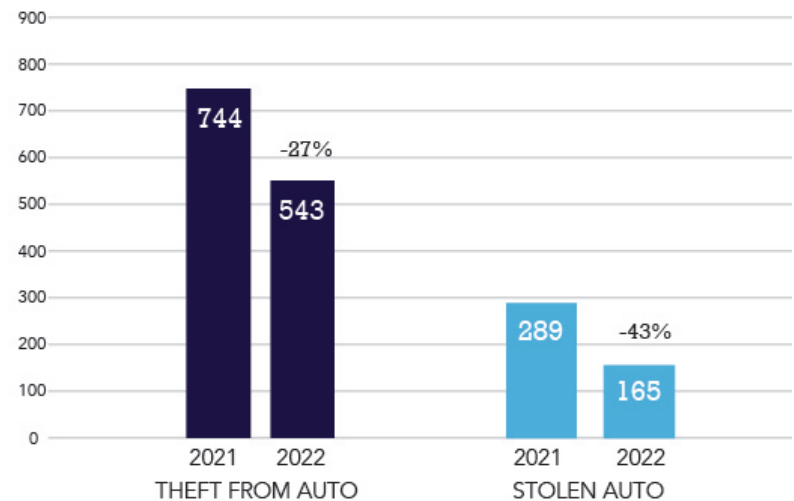
- The MID has had four reported homicide incidents YTD. There was one incident YTD in 2021.
- In all four cases, the victims appear to have been targeted and arrests were made in each case.

Other News and Notes:

We are pleased that Midtown resident **Darin Schierbaum** was named APD’s Chief of Police. Midtown Blue has installed **18 license plate readers** (LPRs) to create a new layer of security and surveillance in the district. The \$144K project was funded by the Midtown Improvement District.

Property Crime is Down -27% Year to Date

73% of the total incidents of crime in Midtown in '22 YTD involved car break-ins or stolen vehicles.

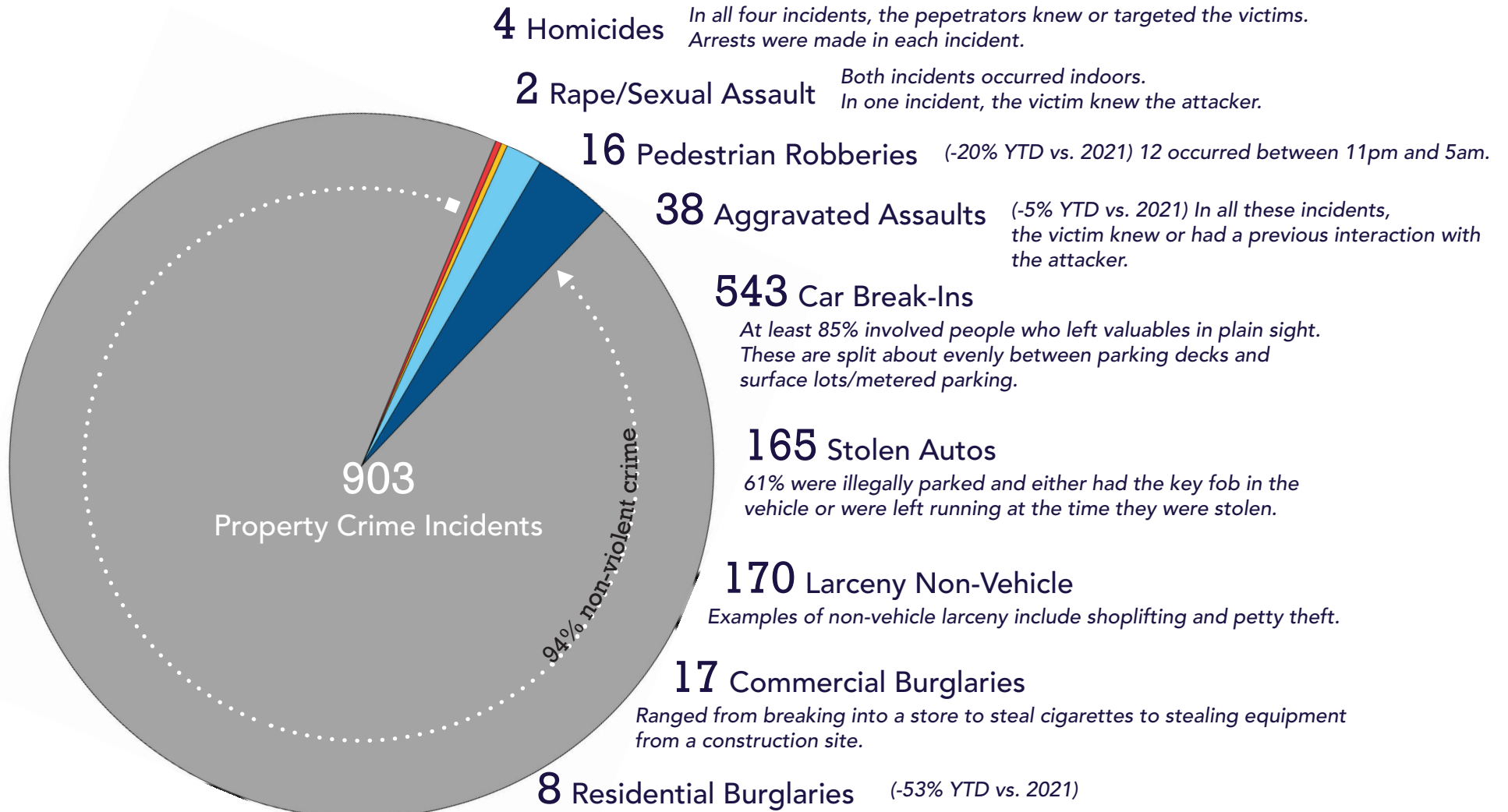
- Many of these crimes are preventable with valuables left in plain sight or keys in vehicles.
- 61% of cars stolen in Midtown this year were illegally parked and running, or with their key fobs in them.

94% of total incidents of crime in Midtown YTD are non-violent property crimes.

Property crimes involving cars (break-ins and stolen autos) make up the majority of these incidents.

Public Safety Spotlight:

How Midtown Blue and Midtown Green Located the Suspect Involved in a Hate Graffiti Spree + Restored the Rainbow Crosswalks

We pick a topic to highlight for each of our summaries. In this report, we look at the systems and partnerships that brought swift resolution to a hate crime in Midtown.

Over a three-day period in mid-August, an individual vandalized the Rainbow Crosswalk at Piedmont Ave. and 10th St. and then the Federal Reserve building at Peachtree and 10th St. with a hate symbol and anti-gay slurs.

Midtown Green personnel, **Jonathan Hurst** and **Kamal Harchaoui**, reported for duty and cleaned up the graffiti at 10th and Piedmont.

Using the video surveillance network, Midtown Blue Public Safety Officers (PSOs) were able to capture an image of the suspect involved in the incident. Soon after the second incident occurred on August 19, images of the suspect went out to all local law enforcement partners.

While conducting their patrols, **PSO Desmar Burton** and **Sgt. Kristian McClendon** were near Peachtree and 6th Streets when they recognized the suspect exiting a local store. Using Midtown Blue's camera network, they tracked the suspect to a residential building.

Midtown Blue APD Lt. Chris Tiernan and **PSO Lt. Dan Istok**, contacted APD Zone officers who responded to the building. APD and Homeland Security were able to locate the address for the individual inside the residential building and with the assistance of the APD SWAT team, they soon had the suspect in custody without incident.

This is one example of how the coordinated infrastructure, personnel and partnerships that make up the Midtown Blue supplemental public safety program work together to achieve quick resolution to crime.
