United States Potato Service offers potatoes baked, fried, mashed and souped in downtown Akron, by Megan Becka, Cleveland.com: If potatoes are your thing, United States Potato Service in downtown Akron has a russet for you.

The restaurant name is a twist on the United States Post Office, which is fitting since the restaurant is located in what used to be a post office. The restaurant opened at 209 S. Main St. in late November. "I've had United States Potato Service









in my head since 2011," owner Danny Basone told cleveland.com."It's my take on potatoes in Akron and Devo—there are a lot of references to spuds."

Basone, who also owns the Lockview restaurant next door, calls the menu at USPS the simplest he has done.

Popular menu items include potato soup sans sans lactose, poutine fries and disco fries. The restaurant's chili fries feature Lockview's signature chili atop crispy waffle fries, according to Basone. <u>READ MORE</u>





Tony Troppe details \$52M redevelopment of Akron's old Beacon Journal building

Akron developer Tony Troppe says he's going to turn the former Akron Beacon Journal building and an adjacent parcel into a mixed-use development consisting of nearly 200 residential units, food purveyors and other businesses.

In December, Troppe won \$5.3 million in state tax credits for the project, which the state says will have a total cost of \$52.2 million, based on Troppe's application for the credits. Troppe said he has negotiated the purchase of the property from Alabama's Capstone Development and is in the process of closing the transaction.-Dan Shingler, Crain's Cleveland Business, Jan. 10, 2024

Welty moving ahead with \$31M residential development in downtown

If at first you don't succeed, try-and apply-again.

That's often a tactic when working with tax credits, and the developer behind a \$31 million residential development project planned for downtown Akron said he'll reapply for historic tax credits for the project, after losing out in the recent round of state awards.

"If you believe in downtown, you want to keep investing in downtown," said Don Taylor, CEO of Welty Building Co., who hopes to redevelop Akron's CityCentre building into 117 new apartments.

The building, as it's now being redesigned, would have more than 100 one-bedroom and studio apartments, with a "handful" of two-bedroom units, Taylor said. Rents are expected to be between 1,300 and 1,500 a month. – Dan Shingler, Crain's Cleveland Business, Jan. 18, 2024

The Akron city government began moving residents out of a vibrant, majority Black neighborhood in the 1960s before razing the land in the 1970s to make way for the Innerbelt.





The International Institute of Akron says it resettled 518 new refugees in 2023, with the largest segments coming from the Democratic Republic of Congo, Syria, Myanmar, Afghanistan and Sudan. Hundreds more received assistance through the nonprofit's immigration legal services, employment resources, extended social services, education and interpreting and translation.

Ohio House Approves \$2.5M for City of Akron

In February, the Ohio House of Representatives voted 75-19 in favor of House Bill 2 which earmarks \$350M from the state's pandemic fund. This funding includes \$2.5M to the City of Akron to support the redevelopment of Cascade Plaza through repairs to the Cascade parking

structure which sits beneath four tower buildings on the downtown plaza.

Akron's application was supported by a number of community stakeholders, including the University of Akron, Akron Energy Systems, the County of Summit, Huntington Bank, Akron Children's Hospital, Testa Companies, Downtown Akron Partnership, OKSK, LLC, Akron RubberDucks, the Greater Akron Chamber, Summa Hospital, the Akron Art Museum, PNC Bank, Development Finance Authority, Summa Hospital, and Akron/Summit Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Participants are encouraged to head to breweries that they may not be familiar with or to try a new craft beer at their favorite spot. The journey begins by picking up a passport at any brewery along the Brew Path. Users need to visit and make a purchase at each location to receive a stamp on their passport. The minimum number of stamps needed for completion is 17, but the potential for larger prizes comes from visiting all 21 breweries. Akron Civic Theatre Generates \$20M Annually in Economic Activity

Akron Civic Theatre's recently completed economic impact report, created by Dr. Shawn Rohlin, Department of Economics, Kent State University and Dr. Amanda Weinstein, Department of Economics, University of Akron, indicates the theater generates \$20M+ annually in economic activity, and "perhaps more importantly, strengthen[s] the case for employee recruitment and retention in our increasingly place-based employment economy."

Key findings from the study include:

- The Akron Civic Theatre is a major driver of employment. Its recent \$9M capital campaign supporting building restoration and expansion had a construction impact creating 84 jobs and generating \$13.5M in economic activity and \$1.3M in local, State and Federal taxes.
- The Civic's annual programming and operations support 107 jobs driving \$13M in economic activity and \$1M+ in local, State and Federal taxes.
- Patrons attending events at the Akron Civic Theatre support an additional 425 jobs, \$18M in wages, and \$4.2M in local, State and Federal taxes.
- Over the next 5 years, the report estimates that the civic will create or support more than 2,500 jobs in the local area, increasing residents' incomes by more the \$112M, with a total spending impact of \$197M
- For every 10 jobs directly created or supported by the civic, an additional 4 jobs are likely to be created or supported in other industries.
- Within 30 years, the civic's economic impact will grow to over 9,700 jobs and \$735M in total spending.

The Akron Civic Theatre enhances the quality of life in Akron and Summit County at a time when our economy is increasingly driven by the ability to work from anywhere, making community amenities a priority to attract and retain a quality workforce.

Shammas Malik wraps up first month as Akron mayor with community development on his mind




