Plannerz Place Eatery opened in Summit County in March, by Kerry Clawson, Tawney Beans, Akron Beacon Journal: Soul food has found a home in Akron's Northside Marketplace—a space where businesses can rent kitchens, booths and shelf space for their products by way of The Plannerz Place Eatery.

The new restaurant celebrated its grand opening March 28-30. It offers a rotating menu with southern staples, including fried chicken wings, hoppin' johns, candied yams and collard greens.

"Our food is made fresh, cooked fresh, made with a lot of love [and] good seasonings," said [owner, Tonya] Essick. by lifelong Akron resident Darletta Turner, offers mental health and behavioral health counseling for individuals and families and counseling education for providers at 7 N. Main St.

Turner accepts patients with private insurance as well as those who have Medicare and Medicaid, she said.

"Mental health services need to be available and accessible to everyone in the community."

Part of Turner's commitment to ensuring more people have access to mental health services includes offering education and supervision for new counselors, who are required to work under a counselor supervisor for 1.5-2 years, she said. She is hoping to develop relationships with local universities to help new counselors. <u>READ MORE</u>





The renovations began a year ago. What was promised is coming to life on time and on budget, officials said. Over 500 thousand people would flood into Lock 3 annually for concerts, festivals and events. But the past pavilion was only temporary.

"We kind of often joke it was a 20-year pop-up that was the most successful pop-up," remarks [Dan] Rice. "And all we want to do is build upon that great success, but turn it into a 365-day park."

The new Maynard Performance Pavilion is a permanent structure, with updated tech for lighting and sound. A \$5 million state funding boost for Akron's Cascade Plaza will help to make the block a "hub of downtown's comeback," Mayor Shammas Malik said Wednesday.

The city is receiving money for the project from what some lawmakers have called the "super duper fund"—a one-time \$700 million local project fund through which Ohio lawmakers can identify and fulfill grant requests. Renovated 159 Main Building Home to Residential Units and Mix of Businesses

Right across the street from Crave on the corner of Main and Bowery streets, the 11-story 159 Main structure was formerly known as the Law Building—and before that, the Key Building and Second National Bank Building.

The building has undergone several changes since owner Tom Rybak purchased the property in 2016 for \$2 million.

He said he's since put about \$27 million into improvements, not only adding luxury apartments on the top six floors, but also renovating the space to accommodate commercial tenants such as Signal Akron, NAC Products and Market on Main, as well as an event area.—*Patrick Williams, Akron Beacon Journal, Apr. 26, 2024*



Urban League, University of Akron Get Share of \$14.9M in Federal funds

Two projects in Akron are slated to receive part of more than \$14.9 million coming into the area from the Consolidations Appropriations Act of 2024.

The projects were submitted as part of U.S. Rep. Emilia Sykes' funding request to the House Appropriations Committee for Ohio's 13th Congressional District—each representative may request "earmarks" for up to 15 projects in fiscal year 2024.

To help continue its work with polymers, the University of Akron will receive \$1,050,000 for the construction of a roughly 20,000-square-foot building on campus that will house a Polymer Research, Development and Production Facility that will contain a polymerization scale-up laboratory and other labs as well as a manufacturing incubator for new materials and a space to test materials.—*Kassi Filkins, Signal Akron, Mar. 13, 2024*

Proactive Grant to Help with Equitable Downtown Development

Akron Community Foundation's board of directors recently approved a proactive grant that will help bring equitable access for future investment and development to downtown Akron. The \$52,000 grant to Downtown Akron Partnership (DAP) will enable the organization to develop an equitable framework as it continues to bring new businesses and residency to the city's core.

Much like the Elevate Greater Akron initiative, an areawide partnership that focuses in part on equitable housing and commercial real estate, this project will create a framework that "informs and instructs equitable economic development holistically," according to DAP. For example, one of the main recommendations of an earlier downtown plan includes a possible hotel near the John S. Sojourner Truth Legacy Plaza featured in Essence Magazine

Hundreds gathered in Akron, Ohio, on Wednesday to unveil the plaza and statue where the Universalist Old Stone Church once stood, the location of the Ohio Women's Rights Convention, The Associated Press reports.

Sojourner Truth, born Isabella Bomfree in the Hudson Valley around 1797, was a formerly enslaved person. After securing her freedom in 1826, she took the name Sojourner Truth and became an influential abolitionist and women's rights pioneer. Her 1851 speech drew upon her experiences of slavery and questioned why her humanity and that of other enslaved African Americans were not recognized as equal to that of white Americans.

The new Sojourner Truth Legacy Plaza, which replaces the old church site, features a statue by artist Woodrow Nash, an Akron, Ohio native. The statue depicts Truth holding a book, symbolizing her literacy and advocacy. It stands atop an impala lily, Ghana's national flower, honoring Truth's paternal heritage.—*Melissa Noel, Essence, June 3, 2024*


