DAP Is Working for Downtown

Downtown Akron Partnership's (DAP) mission is to build and promote a vibrant and valuable downtown that is open and welcoming to all people. Like all organizations, DAP has had to adapt to the uncertainties caused by the global pandemic, but the commitment to our mission continues to drive our efforts.

In the second quarter of 2021, DAP created the new Downtown Guide to illustrate the idea that downtown is a place for all people, with experiences, opportunities and resources that only downtown can deliver. DAP worked with 11 local photographers to create the guide which begins to encourage people to see downtown as a unique place, open to all, with new opportunities waiting to be unlocked.

DAP staff also worked diligently with storefront business owners to help them navigate the application process for the City of Akron Downtown Storefront Relief Grant. As a result, DAP was able to distribute these CARES Act funds to over 40 businesses on the path to reemerging from the hardships of the pandemic.

The second quarter also saw DAP celebrating and promoting the opening of new residential properties alongside existing residential properties with a Downtown Residency Open House, that included 159 Main, The Bowery, The Standard, 401 Lofts, Northside Lofts and Townhomes and Canal Square.

DAP continued to build upon a history of excellent programming and space activation by bringing back a full season of fitness programs, monthly roller skating on Cascade Plaza, doggie bootcamp, solo concert performances in Northside Green, recess games on Main St. at Lock 3, walking, biking and scooter tours, and the introduction of two Try-Cycle activity bicycles to Main St. The Try-Cycles are mobile activity machines, carrying art supplies, music-making items, books for visitors to keep, games and more.

In addition to the activities mentioned above, DAP staff and ambassadors continued to work to make downtown clean, safe and welcoming, including planting and maintaining hundreds of planters, flower beds and boxes across downtown.

Akron's Pritt Entertainment Group keeps hightech focus in historic building, by Marc Bona, Cleveland.com: If you tune in to a major-league sporting event, there's a chance

that before anyone takes the ice, field, or court, you're going to see something produced by Pritt Entertainment Group.

Based in the heart of downtown Akron, the small company creates high-tech videos for teams and companies all over the world from its home base—the Carlton Building, a 121-year-old structure that



PEG—as it's branded—bought and renovated starting in 2018. It's a symbiotic mesh of very old and new, with the building's rich history being preserved by the modern company. The firm maintains about 20 sports and corporate clients, from the Vegas Golden Knights to University of Akron football.

At its core are a pair of brothers raised in Portage County who have kept their base in Northeast Ohio. Their unassuming start in the business dates to when Ryan was in middle school. Along the way he hired his tech-savvy and creative brother Jeffrey, and a client roster has snowballed.

They work in a building that served as one of several anchors along S. Main Street in Akron, whose past is

rooted in bygone days. The Pritts have breathed life into a once dilapidated building, making it home to their very high-end digital world. On May 19, the renovations Pritt


of Julia Belle's Seasonings, which sells spice blends and mixes in downtown Akron, as well as across the country.

DAP Supports Small Business

City of Akron Storefront Relief Grant

DAP helped the city of Akron administer the City of Akron Downtown Storefront Relief Grant. The grant is designed to support downtown small business storefronts and help them recover from the impacts of COVID-19. To date, 60 downtown businesses have received the grant.

Restaurant Relief

The restaurant business remains one of the most challenging businesses to operate. Impacts of the pandemic, from health compliance to supply chain and staffing challenges, continue to threaten the sustainability of the industry that brings character, culture, vibrancy and value to downtown's street level storefronts. To help, the State of Ohio has created four new grant programs, in support of Food and Beverage Establishments, Entertainment Venues, and the Lodging Industry (up to \$30,000 in grants for each), as well as a New Small Business grant for businesses established between Jan 1, 2020 and Dec. 31, 2020, of up to \$10,000. More information is available at businesshelp.ohio.

Elevate Greater Akron

DAP is participating in ongoing EGA work as a member of the Steering Committee, Economic Development Working Group, Refocus on Downtown, and New BRE teams of Elevate 2.0.

The New BRE established a downtown priority portfolio with DAP leading those visits. Visits that intersect downtown in the Minority Owned Business and Top 25 business portfolios are also attended by DAP.

DAP schedules BRE visits with the new focus on downtown portfolio and attends visits with downtown businesses in other portfolios. To date DAP has lead 10 Downtown EGA BRE Meetings, with the goal of completing 45 by the end of the calendar year.

Legacy Cities

DAP was invited by James Hardy to participate in the Legacy Cities program through the Lincoln Institute on Land Policy. Suzie joins James Hardy, Heather Rosczyzk, Theresa LeGrair, and Ace Epps on the project that will focus on Rubber City Match in downtown with a particular focus on equity. The program has launched and we are encouraging applications.

DORA

DAP hosted a meeting with businesses owners in the DORA to discuss summer plans and rules around festivals and other events in early June. Wild Oscars, a new event space underneath the Akron Civic Theatre will open on Friday nights this summer and will sell DORA beverages during Lock 3 concerts. Baxter's re-opened May 18 and is part of the DORA.

Downtown Residential Open House

Downtown continues to grow into a vibrant, active residential neighborhood through the redevelopment of several buildings on Main St., and on E. Exchange, and with renovations to existing properties. And, there are more opportunities to live downtown coming.

Working with building owners and managers, DAP presented a downtown residential open house on Saturday, June 26 from 2 - 5 p.m. Properties that offered tours included Northside Lofts and Townhomes, Canal Square Lofts, The Bowery, The 159 Main, The Standard and 401 Lofts.

"The downtown neighborhood has a lot to offer its residents. Access to green space and the Towpath Trail, proximity to restaurants and arts and entertainment," states Kimberly Beckett, director of business relations for DAP.


The Open House attracted between 75 - 100 visitors during the 3-hour period. Visitors were also given welcome bags with information about downtown amenities, snacks and a drink ticket for the DORA. Spin eScooters were also unlocked for visitors to use during the event. DAP encouraged Open House participants to stay in downtown to enjoy the evening's RubberDucks game, the concert in Lock 3 by Midnight Star, or dinner in any of the restaurants nearby.

"Enjoyed the residential open house this afternoon. Nice seeing what options are available living downtown," said Herndon Robinson, who visited during the Open House.

With the completion of much of the Main St. Corridor Project, exciting additions and renovations to the Akron Civic Theatre and other downtown properties, along with the addition of world-class public art and street beautification efforts, downtown has a renewed sense of possibility, and DAP actively promotes the high quality of life to be experienced as a downtown resident.

Juneteenth Celebrations

DAP was pleased and honored to work with a number of community organizations and individuals to help bring Juneteenth celebrations to three neighborhoods across the city.

Juneteenth commemorates June 19, 1865, the date in which Union troops arrived in Galveston Bay, Texas and announced that 250K enslaved people in Texas were free by executive decree. Newly freed people in Texas christened the day "Juneteenth" and the day has been celebrated for over 150 years.

Community leader, Gerald R. Carter, who died in 2020, founded the Juneteenth Festival in West Akron in 1998 after learning about Juneteenth during a trip to Dallas in the mid-1990s. Initially, the festival was held at John Brown House, and later moved to Stoner/Hawkins Park.

"The celebration of Juneteenth has become an all-city venture. It's what Gerald Carter wanted. This year, it gelled beautifully," Reva Golden said.

On June 19, the Akron Juneteenth Festival was held in Stoner/Hawkins Park on the West side of town, featuring food, vendors and artists, music and a talent show.

Summit Historical Society presented a family picnic, panel discussion and performance of "The Life of John Brown," a play written by Reva Golden. DAP hosted Gospel singing and Skate Night with Phuture Boogie on Cascade Plaza, and programmed live music in restaurants throughout downtown. DAP also worked with Inda Blatch-Geib, Bill Myers of S3 Technology and artists Dara Harper and Diane Johnson to create a window display and an augmented reality experience for Juneteenth in the window of the Circulation Building in The Bowery.

The North Akron Community Development Corporation hosted a film screening and discussion of *One Night in Miami,* as well as a World Refugee Day Celebration at Exchange House. The National Center for Choreography at the University of Akron presented a YoutTube premier of a collection of short dance films by Cara Hagan and her artistic collaborators as part of NCCAkron's Community Commissioning Residency. The Akron Symphony performed a program of music by African American composers at E.J. Thomas Hall.

In all, Juneteenth programming was enriched and enhanced by numerous partners, such as the Akron Black Artist Guild, Akron Juneteenth, Akron Symphony Orchestra, the City of Akron, DAP, North Akron Community Development Corporation, NCCAkron, Summit County Historical Society, and others.

Downtown Summer Programming

The 2021 summer programming schedule is full of fun activities for all, six days a week. The schedule includes free fitness/wellness classes (DrumFIT, FamilyFIT, Exercise Basics, Kickboxing, Line Dancing, Nutrition 101, Pop-up Dance Classes with ArtSparks, POUND, Taiji, Thank Dog! Bootcamp, Yoga and Zumba), roller skating parties, walking, scooter and bike tours, live music, Recess on Main and new activity carts called the Downtown Try Cycle. All events and activities are free to attend thanks to the generous support of the Knight Foundation, Ohio Arts Council and KeyBank.

Roller skating on Cascade Plaza has been expanded to two parties per month: Family Skate is held on the first Saturday of the month, from 3 to 6 p.m., and Skate Night is held on the third Saturday of the month, from 6 to 9 p.m. Family Skate features music from Kevin Richards and DJ Ness, and Skate Night features music from the DJ collective Phuture Boogie. Rental skates are available in children's and adult sizes for \$2 a pair.

New this year is the concert series, Busking in the Green, which showcases a different peformer every Saturday from 6 - 7 p.m. in the Northside Green, through September 25. The concerts make use of the EarthQuaker Seismic Station, a custom-made cabinet on wheels with a stool, chalkboard sign, microphone and stand, and a rechargeable, battery-powered amplifiers, complete with four EarthQuaker Devices effects pedals. Performers have ranged from classical musicians, to Irish fiddler players, Latin jazz musicians and singer-songwriters.


2021 Downtown Guide



Check out the Redesign Plans for Lock 3 Coming Next Year

by Abbey Marshall, The Devil Strip, Apr. 2021 Lock 3 wasn't meant to be Akron's central park.

Eighteen years ago, the downtown patch of grass where dilapidated buildings once stood was simply that. But hundreds of concerts and scores of festivals later, Lock 3's 300,000-some annual visitors have turned it into a beloved site for summer entertainment, lunchtime walks, winter ice skating and more.

"I refer to Lock 3 as the city's most successful pop-up," says James Hardy, the Deputy Mayor for Integrated Development. "The city acquired and demolished the buildings and parking structure there and erected a temporary entertainment venue as a way to draw people downtown. It was never meant to be a permanent park or venue. It ended up being wildly successful."

As a result, the facilities and infrastructure—or lack thereof—remain relatively the same as they were when the park was thrown together in 2003.

Now the city, in partnership with <u>Akron Civic Commons</u>, is preparing design plans for a \$10 million reimagining of Lock 3, with construction beginning as early as 2022.

Akron Area is No. 12 Emerging Housing Market in Nation in Debut of Ranking System

The Akron area is turning heads in residential real estate by yet another measure this week with the debut of a new tool to analyze market activity.

On the heels of a <u>Realtor.com report</u> ranking Akron as the 20th-hottest housing market last month, the homebuying region that includes Summit and Portage counties scored a No. 12 ranking in the inaugural Wall Street Journal/Realtor.com Emerging Housing Markets Index released Tuesday.

The new index, which will be updated quarterly, takes steps beyond the industry group's "hottest" cities criteria "to rank which housing markets are expected to provide a strong return on investment — and are a nice place to live."

Factoring into the scores are real estate supply and demand, median home listing price trends, unemployment, wages, regional price parities, amenities, commutes, populationpercentage of foreign-born residents and small-business activity.

Akron is Among 50 Finalists in Bloomberg Philanthropies' 2021 Global Mayors Challenge

Akron is a finalist for a \$1 million grant to grow 200 Black-owned businesses by 2030.

Bloomberg Philanthropies announced Tuesday morning that Akron Mayor Dan Horrigan is among 50 in the world still in the hunt for the \$1 million grants. The 50 finalists with ideas to help their residents bounce back from the pandemic emerged from a pack of 630 applicants representing 99 countries in the 2021 Global Mayors Challenge.

Applicants filed their ideas in March. The next phase involves "expert support" from Bloomberg Philanthropies to hone the top 50 ideas before 15 grant winners are announced in early 2022.

Horrigan is pitching THRIVE (Targeted Help for Resilient InnoVative Entrepreneurs), a program to grow Blackowned businesses that are under-represented in the local retail sector.

University of Akron, City Team Up for Arts-based Initiative

The city of Akron wants to boost its population. The University of Akron would undoubtedly like to see more students. Those guests can be intertwined.

"If you look at successful universities and successful cities, they have relationships that are positive," said Akron Mayor Dan Horrigan.

In a talk with the Akron Roundtable last month, UA president Gary Miller said the university needs to redefine what it means to be a campus post-pandemic. Officials are turning to their downtown partners and the area's art scene to help figure it out.

AkronArts is a new wide-ranging initiative that looks to better connect some of the university's arts offerings with the city. University spaces, like the Polsky Building in Akron, will be repurposed. The downtown dwelling will house some of UA's arts programs while becoming a place for community members to visit for arts offerings.

E.J. Thomas Hall and the Akron Civic Theatre will pair together to host more programming, and the National Center for Choreography will have more offerings, too.

Cities Are Boosting the Economy by Rewarding Those Who Shop Local

When stay-at-home orders were imposed last year, 43% of small businesses in the United States closed temporarily.


Businesses owned by people of color were hit especially-hard, having reduced access to funding and federal relief programs.


To help, the city of Akron, Ohio, launched a unique program to reward citizens for shopping locally. For every purchase a customer makes through Akronite, a city-sponsored app, they receive "blimps" or reward points. (Goodyear Tire and Rubber, and its famous Goodyear Blimp, are based in Akron.) Blimps can be redeemed at any of the participating stores for discounted or even free services. At the end of every month, the city reimburses the businesses for these redeemed values.

"We are creating a circular economy," says James Hardy, Akron's deputy mayor of integrated development. "We are encouraging citizens to spend money while putting cash back into their pockets."

...The Akron app launched in August 2020 has more than 5,000 users today, driving \$500,000 worth of economic activity, based on \$40,000 government investment, generating nearly \$9 of economic impact per dollar spent.

Installation of Bronze Statue Downtown is Dedication to the Men and Women Who Built Akron

Johnnie Downs returned from the Vietnam War in 1967 with no idea where he would work. He spent the next 18 years making tires at BF Goodrich.

"The conditions were bad, but the money was good," said Downs, who is now 74 and retired. "See, the thing about working the job, sometimes you had to do what you had to do to take care of your family. And this was a means of me taking care of my family and my children."

Downs stood Thursday morning with a few dozen people invited by the city of Akron to witness the unveiling of a 15-foot-tall bronze rubber worker statue. The commemorative work of art was sculpted by Zanesville artist Alan Cottrill and modeled after the 1920s tire worker on the cover of "Wheels of Fortune," a book by former Beacon Journal writers David Giffels and Steve Love.

As elected officials, artists and others involved in the project pulled away a green parachute to reveal the statue, Downs and fellow BF Goodrich retiree Heskiah Lampley thought about how the rubber industry built Akron.

Historical Influx Of Money Will Allow Large Scale Community Investments

City of Akron, Mayor's Office Press Release, Apr. 2021

The City of Akron will be receiving \$153,370,000 of direct federal funding from the American Rescue Plan. This funding represents the largest positive fiscal jolt to the City budget in history. These federal dollars will be used as a catalyst to kick start programs focused on inclusive economic growth, vibrant public spaces and recreation for all, and a substantial investment in residential housing, all while addressing continued immediate needs as fallout from the pandemic. The funds will be distributed in two rounds. The first will be distributed in May 2021 and the second in May 2022. The funds must be spent by December 31, 2024.

"This pandemic has profoundly affected our City," said Akron Mayor Dan Horrigan. "This federal funding is the boost we need to not only get back on our feet, but to create lasting growth and positive change for future generations. We are looking carefully at how we spend this money equitably in a way that benefits everyone, especially focusing on those hardest hit by the pandemic."

Mayor Horrigan and his administration have identified six key priorities for expenditures. Each priority has an estimated funding allocation which will be further defined as specific program details and investments are determined. Final Federal guidance is forthcoming which may impact the specific investments for each priority.

- Housing Estimated \$25M
- Housing rehabilitation grant program, residential building grants for infill housing
- Public Utility Support Estimated \$25M
- Investments in drinking water infrastructure including lead services and water mains, ongoing Akron Cares Utility Bill Relief grant program
- Local Economic Recovery Estimated \$24M
- Small business loans, supporting entrepreneurship ecosystem/ access, assisting local sectors directly impacted by COVID-19, supporting downtown Akron recovery, increasing job readiness/ access/employment services, investing in Vacant Building Registry to combat blight
- \bullet Community and Youth Violence Prevention Estimated \$20M $\,$
- Youth employment programs/training, Youth Violence Prevention Strategic Plan priorities, recreational assets for teens and young adults, gun violence reduction strategies or programming
- Parks and Public Facilities Estimated \$30M
- Investments in City park and public space projects, community center capital needs, downtown parking deck maintenance.
- City IT and Budget Stabilization Estimated \$29M
- Replace revenue lost due to the pandemic's economic impacts, maintaining at least \$25 million in cash reserves through 2026 to weather additional economic fallout/potential tax code changes, invest in existing city workforce, continued hardware replacement and cybersecurity upgrades.
