Akron's TinyCircuits Kickstarter campaign for new TinyTVs fullyfunded in minutes, by Megan Becka, Cleveland.com: When Akron-based tiny open-source electronics manufacturer TinyCircuits launched the Kickstarter campaign for its TinyTV products last week, it was hoping to raise \$15,000 over the course of 30 days to fund the project. To company founder Ken Burns' surprise, the campaign was fully funded in 19 minutes.

"Our first day was pretty crazy, we did like \$60,000 in one day—it was wild to watch it crank up," Burns said.

Just a week later, the campaign has raised more than \$100K by some 1,100 backers.

Once TinyCircuits receives the campaign funding, it will begin work creating 2 different miniature TVs in its downtown Akron office: the TinyTV 2 and the TinyTV Mini.

"TinyCircuits has been around for about 11 years now, and we have these little modular boards. One of the things we came out with years ago is a little screen. One of our customers put that into a TV set and made a little hobby project out of it," Burns said. <u>READ MORE</u>

#### Looking for a new place to dine? Here are some Summit County restaurants that opened in 2022

(Crave, Akron), by Tawney Beans, Akron Beacon Journal: After a healthy dose of anticipation from local foodies, Crave opened within its new home in downtown Akron's Landmark Building. The two-story space formerly housed the Akron Savings and Loan and has the ornately plastered, restored ceiling tiles to prove it.







Couple and co-owners Dana and Aaron Hervey have been in the restaurant business for 21 years. The great location was a big factor for Aaron, who cited the 500,000 guests that the Akron Civic Theatre and Lock 3 draw downtown annually as well as a total of about 200 apartment dwellers in the building above the restaurant and across Main Street at The 159. <u>READ MORE</u>

We sampled 11 Akron-area comfort foods. Here's what to check out as temps drop (The Lockview, by Kerry Clawson and Luigi's Restaurant, by Craig Webb): At The Lockview restaurant in downtown Akron, I went for a real gourmet twist on a grilled cheese sandwich and tomato soup, the ultimate comfort food lunch. The landmark eatery, which opened in late 2007, is known for its 15 luxurious takes on the American sandwich favorite.

The No. 11 grilled cheese was the most amazing comfort food combo l've ever had, featuring rich bits of butter-poached lobster with deliciously gooey melted mozzarella. This extravagantly gourmet sandwich comes with a nice element of green—arugula—and is served with creamy lemon-pepper aioli on perfectly buttery-crispy country butter-top bread.

#### Luigi's Restaurant

I have never had to specify if I want cheese on my salad... that was until I walked into Luigi's in Akron for the first time.

This restaurant on North Main Street has been around since 1949, and it has been serving up pizza and Italian dishes along with its famous salad with cheese to generations of hungry fans.

The food here is great, but truthfully I would be in my happy place simply sitting in a corner booth (facing the door, of course, as this is an Italian joint) simply eating my Italian tossed salad with cheese. <u>READ MORE</u>



## Bounce fosters mentorship and community for minority entrepreneurs

Community members gathered [in October] at Bounce's Startup Showcase in Downtown Akron. The event provided an opportunity for entrepreneurs to show off their businesses. Many of them are participants of Bounce's GROW program, which stands for Generating Real Opportunity and Wealth. GROW primarily serves minority and women entrepreneurs.

68.8% of Bounce's clients were women or minorities in 2021, and 114 entrepreneurs participated in GROW programming last year.

"We always envisioned it as being three tracks for people with ideas, people who just started a small business and then people who had a small business who needed additional support," Chief Operating Officer Jessica Sublett said. —*Abigail Bottar, Ideastream Public Media, Oct. 6, 2022*

## Akron musicians seek to reinvigorate jazz at UA

In a city steeped in jazz history, local jazz musicians Theron Brown and Chris Coles, both University of Akron alumni and active performing and teaching artists throughout Northeast Ohio, have been hired as full-time professors to revamp UA's jazz program.

The university is working to rejuvenate the music school's jazz program in a town once known as the "Jazz Corridor of the Midwest," where jazz clubs on North Howard Street were a popular stop in the 1930s and 40s for musicians including Billie Holiday, Ella Fitzgerald and Louis Armstrong to perform in while traveling between New York and Chicago. Black entertainers stayed at the Matthews Hotel, owned by influential Black hotel proprietor George Mathews.

The city's rich jazz history, which earned Howard Street the moniker "The Harlem of Akron," is a point of cultural importance to Akron's Black community.

"It's extremely important because any history gives us relevance for what we're doing" as jazz artists, said pianist Brown of Akron.—*Kerry Clawson, Akron Beacon Journal, Oct. 20, 2022*

## UA honored again as one of top universities for patents

In September, the National Academy of Inventors (NAI), in conjunction with the Intellectual Property Owners Association (IPO), issued its 10th annual report on top ranked U.S. and international universities receiving the highest issuance of U.S. utility patents by the United States Patent and Trademark Office in 2021.

## Northside Marketplace adds 30 new businesses since October

When [Justin] Lepley took over managing the space in Oct., there were about 35 vendors or about 30% occupancy.

The number of vendors has now doubled, Lepley said, with more being added weekly. It is now at about 70% occupancy.

"I say plants and flowers are my hobby, but entrepreneurship is my passion," he said. "I like helping others grow their business and make their dreams into something more tangible."

Preston Clark, co-owner of 7th Floor Clothing, said the business moved into the space about a year ago.

The makers of distinctively Akron clothing used to be tucked in out of the way spaces.

But the new digs inside the marketspace with a hotel nearby and a popular destination like Luigi's practically right across the street, Clark said, is perfect.

## In 2023, Akron will work toward redeveloping Innerbelt property

While you won't likely see construction equipment or buildings going up next year, 2023 is looking like the year that will determine the fate and future of the site, with a new study and hopefully a federal grant on the way.

Akron's roughly 30-acre Innerbelt property has been vacant for more than five years now, leaving an empty chasm of presumably valuable real estate in the middle of downtown.

So, what's to become of it in the year ahead?

The city is waiting for a study it's commissioned from Liz Ogbu, an Oakland architect, urbanist and consultant who focuses on "spatial justice," including what to do with land that in the past used to house Black neighborhoods before such sites were used for projects like Akron's Innerbelt.

## Akron Community Foundation awards \$5M in quarterly grants

Akron Community Foundation's board recently announced quarterly grants totaling \$5 million and approved \$722,609 in competitive health and human services grants chosen by the foundation's Community Investment Committee, the largest distribution for this grant process in the foundation's history.

Among the nonprofits funded this quarter is the Autism Society of Greater Akron, which was awarded \$5,000 to help expand inclusive social and recreational opportunities for individuals with autism. The nonprofit started a variety of social clubs for children and adults due to increased social isolation stemming from the pandemic. The clubs include a mix of virtual and in-person activities, from online games and talent shows to tennis and yoga. *—Akron Community Foundation News, Dec. 6, 2022*

## Akron, Hudson, Barberton test refreshment districts, see DORA dividends now and in future

Summit County's largest city took its first stab at a DORA district in June 2020 in an area around Lock 3 in downtown.

By May 2022, the city was ready to expand the district along a 1.6-mile stretch from downtown to businesses in the Canal Place development. The addition covered about 145 acres.

Alcoholic beverages purchased in the zone are served in special biodegradable cups, with customers paying an additional fee for the DORA-branded containers.

An early test of the expanded DORA took place in late August during the Akron Pride Festival, attended by

about 30,000 people, said Gert Wilms, Akron Mayor Dan Horrigan's chief of staff.

"When we originally did the first round of legislation, it was a pretty small imprint," Wilms said. "... We (were) hearing from the business community, 'It's such a small footprint. Can we get included?"

Suzie Graham, president and CEO of the Downtown Akron Partnership, said that because big summer events like the Italian-American Festival, the Rib, White & Blue Festival and July 4th fireworks were cancelled, measuring the bigger DORA's effects are premature.

Still, Graham said 46,732 DORA cups were sold this year in the district through early December. In addition to big events, smaller affairs like Fall Fest demonstrate that the DORA is popular.—*Alan Ashworth, Akron Beacon Journal, Jan. 1, 2023*


